we have done the first session for community mobilisation in Mathare, Nairobi. Representatives from five local grass root organisations participated in our workshop on how to use the PLANET App, a mobile platform that will act as a digital hub for community engagement. Through the app, slum residents are able to access news and services, including materials for the prevention of diseases, as well as book medical point services or borrow shared tools and equipment.

in cooperation with Care International and the municipalities of the respective cities. We trained 30 community-based women groups on the production of face masks, which are distributed among slum dwellers. Our sanitation campaign targeting informal settlements has started. Awareness rising campaign materials were developed and community-based youth volunteers are being trained to distribute them. They work directly with the community to explain the key messages. In each of the cities we established a project coordination task team within each mayor's office. A COVID-19 protocol for public market and transport nodes is currently being developed and will be implemented in all three cities.
